What is the Purpose of Government?

ne of my professors in graduate school once asked us, "What do you think is the purpose of government?"

I was eager to hear the responses of some of my classmates because many were city managers and city department heads. Some said "public safety," and others said "infrastructure," "clean water," "sanitation," etc.



But as I contemplated their answers, I realized they weren't actually answering the question. They were listing some of the responsibilities of government, but not its purpose. What the professor wanted was a textbook answer... an answer that would encapsulate the entire meaning of the word "purpose."

I confidently raised my hand and said, "The purpose of government is to provide goods and services that the private sector can't or shouldn't provide and to prevent free riders." He said, "That is absolutely correct Mr. Lancaster!"

Now I don't want to mislead you in thinking that I came up with this answer all on my own. I had read it the night before from a public policy book authored by this same professor. Clearly my answer indicated who actually had read his book (me) and who hadn't (my classmates). All right, enough with my self-aggrandizement.


Let's consider why government is in a better position to provide certain services than the private sector is.

- The first example is public transportation. You've seen buses and light rail operating throughout Los Angeles County – public transportation is made possible only because it is heavily subsidized by taxpayers. If it weren't, the cost to ride public transportation would be astronomical. The private sector is not in a financial position to provide this service because fares would need to be so high to fund it that few, if any, would be able to afford to ride.
- The second example is public safety. Because government has the ability to tax everyone, all have equal access to police, fire and paramedic services funded by tax dollars. Could you imagine if public safety was funded like health insurance is? You would only receive the service if you were insured. So government's ability to tax everyone eliminates what we call "free riders" – those who would take advantage of a public service (public safety, roads and highways) and not pay for it.

Since my days at graduate school, I have worked for a state senator and have served as mayor of my community. In doing so, I've learned much about the purpose of government. I think the late economist Milton Friedman summed up perfectly the purpose and fundamental role of government when he said, "Government should maintain law, order, and policy to prevent coercion; preserve the peace and provide for national defense; adjudicate disputes and enforce contracts voluntarily entered into; define the meaning of property rights...provide [for] a monetary framework; foster competitive markets and overcome technical monopolies; and address neighborhood effects which are actions affecting others (e.g., pollution)...."

I think we can agree that government plays a vital and important role for each of us. In its absence, or when it is deficient, communities will likely degrade into chaos as we have recently witnessed.



CITY OF INDUSTRY Has Clear Vision for the Future

• he City of Industry is looking to the future by honoring its past.

"Our city was envisioned as a city to foster business. It was clear then and it is clear now,"

said Mayor Cory Moss in her State of the City address. "Today, we are home to over 3,000 businesses. Our successful businesses continue to provide an economic boon for our region. As these businesses flourish, they directly create over 67,000 jobs and support over 209,000 jobs in L.A. County."

The City of Industry, which was founded in 1957, is steadfastly focused on creating, supporting and improving jobs, enterprise and regional infrastructure. In 2019, the city was recognized by BizFed (Los Angeles County Business Federation) as one of the top two locations to do business in Los Angeles County.

"All we have to do is look to 2019 to be excited about 2020," said City Councilmember Mark Radecki. "We are moving forward at a good pace."

At the State of the City event in January, Moss and other city leaders pointed to several completed and ongoing projects. The city has successfully advocated for improvements to the SR-57/SR-60 freeway confluence,

which is the worst truck bottleneck in California and the fourth worst in the nation. City Manager Troy Helling said they will continue to work with the City of Diamond Bar, representatives in Washington D.C. and other agencies to improve the chokepoint.

Another ongoing project to improve traffic flow in the city is the addition of grade separations at the city's eight rail-roadway crossings. Five have been completed and two more are under way. The city is working with ACE (Alameda Corridor-East Project) to put roadways under or over rail lines to improve traffic and freight flow, and prevent accidents.

City leaders took a big step toward honoring the region's past with a historic joint partnership between the City of Industry and the cities of Diamond Bar and Chino Hills to preserve the 2,500-acre Tres Hermanos Ranch.

The city continues to support regional resources, including the Industry Sheriff's Youth Activities League (YAL), the Industry Hills Charity Pro Rodeo, Delhaven Community Center and the Workman & Temple Family Homestead Museum.

"The city today continues the proud tradition of supporting these programs of generosity, awareness and assistance," said Moss. "These opportunities allow our businesses to give back, which has proven to be an essential part of successful businesses."

"It is important that we understand the businesses in our communities, learn what they want and deliver it."

Joanne McClaskey IBC Executive Director Supporting businesses is precisely the purpose of the Industry Business Council (IBC), a non-profit professional business organization created to foster a business-friendly community. IBC Executive Director Joanne McClaskey spoke about the importance of understanding the types of businesses in the city to better serve their needs. The group plans to conduct an intensive study of business demographics in 2020.

"It is important that we understand the businesses in our communities, learn what they want and deliver it," McClaskey said.

Kent Valley, executive vice president of Majestic Realty, appreciates all that IBC does. Majestic Realty will be adding three industrial warehouse and e-commerce buildings near the 57/60 interchange.



"The Industry Business Council with the support of the city does a lot to support industries through their Sacramento lobbyists," Valley said. "We look forward to developing more facilities in the City of Industry in the future."

City Mourns Loss of a Legend

Former City of Industry Mayor David Perez died on Feb. 10 following a long illness. He was 74. Though he left the post in 2012, he was still known as "Mayor Dave" around the city.



"He was one of the city's giants," said current Mayor Cory Moss. "He was a very dear friend and mentor, and he will always be remembered as a devoted civic leader who thought in terms of tomorrow." It was not uncommon, Moss said, to see "Mayor Dave" driving around the city, taking note of anything in need of attention.

As mayor for 12 years, Perez played a major role in the redevelopment of the city. He helped increase the number of retail, industrial and manufacturing businesses in the city, making the city's redevelopment agency one of California's largest and most successful entities of its kind. He led the efforts to create the auto mall along the 60 Freeway and oversaw the passage in 2009 of a \$500-million bond to fund the city's modernizing improvements to infrastructure.

He was a lifelong resident of the city, leaving the area only to serve in the Navy as crew chief on a patrol plane in the 1960s. Perez supported many nonprofit organizations, including as president of the El Monte Boys and Girls Club. He was active in the Gabriel Foundation and a founding member of the Industry Sheriff's Station Youth Activities League (YAL).

Known by his family as Uncle Dave, he is survived by his wife Shirley, his brother Pat, and several nieces and nephews.



A LETTER FROM THE CEO

"Our mission is to serve you, take you where you need to go, and return you home safely to your families." Phillip A. Washington he mission of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) is to serve the millions of people in L.A. County who rely on us for their transportation needs. Public transit is an essential service for our community, and to restart America's economy.

I want to assure you that Metro will continue to run, and we will serve L.A. County throughout this crisis. Although our ridership has fallen from a peak of about 1.2 million daily passenger boardings, we are still seeing more than 400,000 average weekday boardings. That's more than many large U.S. transit agencies see during normal times, and it speaks to how necessary Metro is as a mobility provider.

Your health and safety is our top priority. In addition to strengthening our cleaning and sanitation regimes across all Metro vehicles and facilities, beginning in May Metro began requiring all riders on buses and trains to wear face coverings to help prevent the spread of coronavirus and to the extent practical, maintain social distance among riders and operators. This is for your protection as you ride the system. Metro's law

enforcement partners will enforce this requirement to the extent that is practical — and while encouraging voluntary compliance through education, we'll also be considering the best way to enforce this rule going forward.

When this COVID-19 crisis eventually passes, and it will pass, life will be different in L.A. County. This health crisis has shifted our perception of what normal life is and left us all wondering if and when normalcy, as we knew it, will return. The unknown right now is how profoundly this crisis will change L.A. County, our country, and the world.

At Metro, we are working hard to figure out the answers to some really challenging questions. How will public transportation have to adapt to meet new demands by the public? Will telecommuting remain widespread? How will Metro, our society and our culture adapt to accommodate social distancing? What will become our new mobility normal?



As we struggle with these questions and more, I want you to know that we are thinking about you, our customers, every step of the way. Our mission is to serve you, take you where you need to go, and return you home safely to your families.

That is a responsibility I think about every day.

METRO IS ADAPTING

Innovation during tough times

Purple Line Extension tunnels on

Metro was able to take advantage of greatly reduced traffic due to COVID-19 stay-at-home orders by fully shutting down Wilshire Boulevard in Beverly Hills to install a deck as part of the Purple Line Extension to connect Downtown Los Angeles and Westwood. The full shutdown has helped ramp up work on the future subway and

the deck will allow normal traffic to resume while workers continue station excavation below.

More reliable information at your fingertips

Metro has partnered with the Canadian company Transit to replace its default smartphone app. The app, also called Transit, will provide better real-time bus and train arrival information for riders, allow for planning trips across multiple systems and ride-sharing platforms and improve the overall customer experience. The app partnership is free and will save Metro nearly a quarter-million dollars each year in app maintenance and upkeep.

Innovative, new mobility option in the works

Metro is working to bring a new mobility option to Los Angeles County. This new MicroTransit service will be a Metro-operated, on-demand, ride-sharing service. Using vehicles that can be configured to carry up to 10 people, riders will be able to hail rides through a smartphone app. MicroTransit will help augment Metro's NextGen Bus Plan, which will reimagine our bus system to better meet the needs of current and future riders in Los Angeles County, by serving communities where fixed-route services are less available.

Metro and Via deliver food to the needy

Metro's innovative partnership with Via to provide ride-sharing services to and from transit stations in three service zones has begun working with First 5 LA and Para Los Niños to deliver food bank donations and household essentials to families with young children who are unable to go to the store safely and cannot afford to order traditional home delivery groceries. The deliveries take advantage of excess drivers due to decreased demand for ride-sharing services and provide food and goods. So far, the partnership has delivered a total of 57 food and grocery deliveries for 33 families in Central LA. Metro, Via and First 5 LA Best Start are exploring the feasibility of additional deployments with other partners in the First 5 Best Start service areas.



Adjusting to on-the-street realities

Metro has adjusted its bus and rail service to an enhanced Sunday schedule in response to COVID-19 stay-at-home orders. The adjustment has allowed Metro to maintain its workforce while safeguarding essential workers' ability to get around Los Angeles County and riders without cars to carry out essential tasks like grocery shopping and medical appointments. Metro has continually adjusted service levels on a line-by-line basis depending on

demand and operators' ability to maintain social distancing. Metro has a multi-phased plan to add service as conditions warrant going forward.

CUSTOMER AND EMPLOYEE SAFETY

Our Top Priority

During the Covid-19 public health crisis, ensuring the safety and security of our transit customers and our employees has never been more important. With nearly 400,000 boardings each day during the pandemic, we recognize that we have a critical role to play in providing transportation for those making essential trips to hospitals, grocery stores and frontline jobs that benefit us all.

No one can ride public transit without our operators. Protecting their health and safety is critical. That's why Metro has provided its operators and other frontline employees with the personal protective equipment they need to stay safe, including face masks, gloves and hand sanitizers. We've mandated that all bus patrons board from the rear doors, and we have relaxed our requirement to tap fares at the front farebox to greatly reduce close interactions; and Metro now requires that riders wear face coverings. We've also required all operators to use the protective Plexiglas shields installed on their buses to further limit public exposure.

Our system security, law enforcement, and emergency management teams continue to help reduce crime on our system. While the stay-at-home orders have reduced the sheer number of people using our system, we continue to see double digit drops in crime rates in key categories due in part to our outstanding multiagency law enforcement. We have implemented surge strategies in the wake of COVID-19 to reduce criminal activity and provide additional assistance to unhoused individuals riding our system.

For example, Metro's Operation Shelter the Unsheltered offers bus transportation to unhoused and other vulnerable individuals who

may desperately need social service assessment, shelter or mental health services. Since this service began on April 1, approximately 350 unhoused individuals riding the Metro system have accepted bus transportation to nearby shelter beds.

Climate Action

In 2018, Metro reduced greenhouse gas emissions by an additional 13 percent since 2017, a significant accomplishment, as outlined in the 2019 Climate Action and Adaptation Plan (CAAP).

The CAAP guides Metro's planning process for a changing climate, ensuring Metro becomes even more resilient in how it builds new infrastructure and operates what already exists. The CAAP also identifies ways the system can bounce back from and withstand



extreme disruptions weather, natural disasters and others. These measures prioritize net cost savings and benefits to our community and the environment like improving air quality and conserving water.

Metro aims to achieve zero emissions by 2050 through a zero emissions fleet, using 100 percent renewable energy, and installing energy and water efficient systems. Implementing these

measures will cut more than 416,000 metric tons of annual carbon dioxide emissions — the equivalent of taking more than 88,000 passenger vehicles off the road for good.

We are also making progress on other fronts. Since 2012, Metro has significantly reduced total nitrogen oxides (NOx) emissions by 47 percent and particulate matter emissions by 51 percent by expanding the use of renewable natural gas and repowering

older buses with newer, more efficient engines. And there's more to come, which is outlined in Metro's sustainability master plan Moving Beyond Sustainability that will be presented for Metro Board adoption this summer. A draft of that plan can be found at www.metro.net/sustainability.

5 ways to lower your bills— here's how

1. Homeowners Exemption

The Los Angeles County Assessor provides for the exemption of \$7,000 in assessed value from the property tax assessment of any property owned and occupied as the owner's principal place of residence. The exemption reduces the annual property tax bill for a qualified homeowner by up to \$70.

2. Renters Qualify for a Tax Deduction.

California is one of a few states where rent is tax deductible. Simply put, the California Renter's Credit is a non-refundable credit worth sixty dollars (or a hundred and twenty dollars if you're married, filing jointly or a widow/widower) that can be applied to your California income tax if you've lived in a rental property for more than half the year.

3. Lower the temperature on your hot water heater.

Dial it to 120 degrees Fahrenheit. Any hotter, and it could scald you or a loved one. Lower the temperature, and help save money on your energy bill each month. Take advantage of programmable thermostats.

Programmable thermostats allow you to automatically control the temperature in your home, which can save up to 10% on heating and cooling your home by properly adjusting your thermostat.

4. See if the Government Owes You Money

We know it sounds far-fetched, but we're serious. State treasuries throughout the U.S. have more than \$43 billion in unclaimed funds, according to The New York Times. Just sitting around! Waiting for you to come play lost and found.

You can check for yourself! Go to the National Association of Unclaimed Property Administrators website, and enter your name and state. https://unclaimed.org

5. Upgrade Your Curb Appeal save up to \$1,000

In most yards, grass consumes the greatest amount of water. So California is trying to reduce the state's water use by helping home- and business-owners reduce grass in landscapes.

You can receive a rebate up to \$2 per square foot (up to 1,000) of grass yard you replace with "drought tolerant landscape." Skip the grass — fill your lawn with plants requiring little water, fertilizer or maintenance.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We help make it Safe & Clean

Utilizing Partnerships to Get the Job Done

hen the California legislature created the San Gabriel Basin Water Quality Authority (WQA) more than 25 years ago, no one knew how to treat the groundwater or where the money would come from. The WQA was a pioneering agency. Today, we are considered to be one of the experts. The WQA is using this knowledge to form partnerships to complete the groundwater cleanup and to help others make good decisions.

Productive partnerships. WQA worked with the City of South Pasadena to address contamination at their Wilson Reservoir. A granular activated carbon (GAC) wellhead treatment system was partially funded by WQA to clean wells that supply 95 percent of the city's drinking water.

New direction. WQA's primary focus has been on cleaning up contamination plumes in the groundwater. A new focus is on source remediation. We are allocating funds to find and clean up the sources of the contamination before it migrates down to the groundwater.

Advancing technology. Last year, construction began on a new groundwater treatment facility in the Puente Valley Operable Unit, which is funded

primarily by Northrop Grumman. This is the first San Gabriel Valley cleanup project to use reverse osmosis technology. Water from Puente Valley will be used in Hacienda Heights, Rowland Heights and the City of Industry.

Education for the future. WQA is working with other water agencies on a guidebook on how to obtain a policy 97-005 permit from the state Division of Drinking Water for the use of highly impaired groundwater as a drinking water source. With the creation of Sustainable Groundwater Agencies throughout the state more communities are being required to test for contamination within their groundwater sources. Undoubtedly this new condition will mean new 97-005 permits will be issued statewide. Since the WQA has utilized this process for over twenty years it was only natural that the WQA would lead the effort to educate others on this difficult permitting process.

Looking ahead. WQA is working with Wildermuth Environmental to create animations of the basin cleanup to show how the plumes are shrinking. The agency has also introduced legislation with State Sen. Susan Rubio to align WQA board appointments with City Council elections and consolidate reporting requirements to reduce redundancy.

Finishing the job. To date, WQA has jointly funded projects to clean 1.6 million acre-feet of contaminated water. More than \$960 million has been raised, however an additional \$517 million is needed. The WQA is authorized to continue its work through 2030 but continued funding is imperative.

IMPROVING WATER QUALITY IN THE SAN GABRIEL BASIN

 ollowing the discovery of extensive groundwater contamination in the San
 Gabriel Valley in the late 1970s, cleanup progress was slow. So, in 1993, the State formed the WQA.

ITS MISSION: to coordinate, plan, and implement groundwater quality management programs to efficiently remediate groundwater contamination and assist in preventing future contamination.

OUR FOCUS: Work with others to fund groundwater cleanup. From the start, WQA worked with cities, water producers, and regulatory agencies to facilitate treatment and then serve clean water to the San Gabriel Valley. WQA also worked to garner Federal funding to supplement funds from the parties responsible for the contamination. WQA's priority has always been to limit the impact of the cleanup on ratepayers.

LEGISLATION EXTENDS WQA MISSION

THROUGH 2030: In legislation sponsored by State Senator Ed Hernandez, WQA was authorized to continue carrying out its mission until 2030. The WQA's ongoing cleanup efforts are key to a safe and reliable source of water for the San Gabriel Valley's present and future needs," said former congressman David Dreier.

Our History in the San Gabriel Basin

After severe groundwater contamination was detected in the San Gabriel Basin and the EPA designated four Superfund sites in the area, a plan of action was needed. The WQA has coordinated the cleanup efforts since its creation more than 25 years ago. As a result, 1.6 million acre-feet of water has been treated, thus making the region less dependent upon imported water.

- **2019** Construction begins on the first reverse osmosis treatment system in the San Gabriel Valley.
- **2018** WQA advocated for the passage of Proposition 68.
- **2014** WQA acquired the General Discharge Permit needed to continue the cleanup.
- **2013** The WQA mandate is extended through 2030.
- **2012** WQA secures \$10 million in state funding for four projects.
- **2009** WQA obtains additional \$50 million for WQA Restoration Fund. H.R. 910, which established the San Gabriel Basin Restoration Fund to facilitate groundwater cleanup, became Public Law 106-554.
- **2002** The first 15-year BPOU project agreement is executed.
- **1999** WQA spearheads legislation for \$75 million in federal funding.
- **1995** WQA's first treatment facility is completed in Monrovia.
- **1994** WQA adopts a consensus approach to integrating water supply and cleanup programs.
- **1993** WQA is established by the California State legislature.
- **1983** The US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) declares four Superfund sites in portions of the Main San Gabriel Basin.
- **1979** Groundwater contamination is first detected in the San Gabriel Groundwater Basin.



Los Angeles County from Fields and Ranches to Metropolis

ipping along the maze of freeways, Los Angeles County appears to be one monotonous, sprawling metropolis. However, along the side streets and sidewalks, the faces of the people, the diversity of cultures and architectural gems reveal the rich history of the area.

Today more than 10.4 million people call Los Angeles County home, residing in 88 cities and approximately 140 unincorporated areas. The neighborhoods are



both connected by a common history and differentiated by unique past experiences.

Native Americans first settled in the area centuries before Gaspar de Portola and

a group of missionaries arrived in 1769. In 1771, Father Junipero Serra founded the San Gabriel Mission. In 1797, Franciscan monks established the San Fernando Mission Rey de Espana. The area had become known as La Ciudad de Los Angeles (The City of Angels).

The 1800s brought an end to Spanish rule; a transition to Mexican occupation; and finally the area became an American territory in 1848. As time passed people were drawn to sections of the county for various reasons. Gold brought prospectors to the Antelope Valley. After the Civil War, immigrants came and Mexican ranches were divided and became places such as Compton,


Downey, Norwalk, San Fernando, Santa Monica and Pasadena. In the late 1800s, black gold (petroleum) put on the map places such as Whittier, Montebello, Compton, Torrance, Santa Fe Springs, Signal Hill and Inglewood. Vast swaths of fertile land for agriculture and cattle grazing drew farmers and ranchers to the San Fernando Valley.

On Feb. 18, 1850, Los Angeles officially

became one of the 27 original counties of California, which was admitted into the Union just a few months later. Immigrants from all around the world – Europe, Japan, China, Mexico – came to the county creating what is still a diverse patchwork of communities.



Finally, the railroad system led to the growth of many industries from agriculture and oil, to manufacturing and trade, to the motion picture and television industry. The booming economy and rapid growth led to massive public works projects to build road and then freeways and to bring water to the area via the Los Angeles Aqueduct, which opened in 1913. After World War II, the area's ideal climate attracted aircraft manufacturers as well as hundreds of other modern industries.

Over time, the size of the county changed substantially. Originally it was 4,340 square miles along the coast between Santa Barbara and San Diego, then it grew to 34,520 square miles, sprawling east to the Colorado River. Today, the 88 cities and 140 unincorporated areas cover 4,084 square miles and about 27 percent of the state's population calls Los Angeles County home.


Your Pipes. The pipe that connects your home or business to the sewer in the street is known as a sewer lateral. The owner of the home or business is responsible for maintaining the sewer pipes within the home or business and the sewer lateral.

If there is an overflow from your plumbing fixtures (e.g., toilet, sink, shower drain), stop using your water immediately and contact a licensed plumber (or the property owner). You may also need to contact a specialized clean-up service to help remove spilled sewage and disinfect property that came in contact with sewage.

Local Sewers. Local sewers transport sewage from neighborhood homes and businesses to larger, regional sewers. Your city (or other public agency) maintains these local sewers.

- Whether the overflow is ongoing or, if known, when the overflow stopped.
- Estimated area of the overflow (e.g., 10 feet long by 3 feet wide).
